Addressing Homelessness for Expectant Parents, Infants, and Children 3 and Younger: Convening Partners to Build and Communicate a Policy Agenda and Messaging Campaign

Homelessness during pregnancy or in the first three years of a child's life has lifelong consequences for physical health and mental well-being. With support from the Pritzker Children's Initiative, *Housing Is* is working with a coalition of organizations to build a policy agenda and messaging campaign addressing homelessness for families with children prenatal-3 years old and promoting strong early childhood development and economic security. In this session, coalition members will participate in a moderated discussion to provide an overview of our work to date to elevate the message that homelessness is preventable, and that stakeholders must take action to address it. The session will also include time for a listening session to hear from attendees about what messages and policy agenda items are important in their sectors and communities.

Catalyzing Change: Using Community-Level Collaborations to Improve Health Outcomes among PHA Residents

Collaboration among public housing authorities, community-based organizations, health care providers, and payers can reduce negative health outcomes and enable community-centered solutions that address resident needs. In 2020, CLPHA entered into an innovative partnership with a health care partner that uses localized data in combination with community-level collaborations to improve health and social outcomes and drive meaningful change. These partnership models have been implemented at eight PHA sites across the country, where community partners have co-created multi-year, data-driven interventions with a path to sustainability. During this session, panelists will highlight learnings from three interventions to address diabetes prevention, food insecurity, and health and digital literacy through community-based education, coaching, and other activities.

This presentation explores two pilot studies that introduced storytelling as a healing practice in professional development for nursing students and public housing staff. These studies suggest that incorporating storytelling into community health and housing education leads to more personalized, effective interventions, ultimately improving the quality of care in these settings.

Accessing Affordable Assisted Living in Public Housing - The New Jersey ALP Model

New Jersey's Assisted Living Program (ALP) allows residents in publicly subsidized housing to maintain affordable rent while receiving comprehensive assisted living services. This model relies on a partnership between housing providers and ALP providers. Panelists will explore the NJ ALP framework and discuss strategies to replicate it, aiming to expand access to equitable home and community-based services for public housing residents.

Specialized Cohorts and Partnerships-The Power of One Single Parent Program

The San Diego Housing Commission (SDHC) will provide an eight-year overview of "Power of One," a program for single parents receiving Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher rental assistance. "Power of One" is funded by SDHC's Moving to Work funds. It was designed to increase the opportunities for public housing authority (PHA) program participants receiving training and securing employment and services. SDHC will share an in-depth synopsis of the program, which has served over 430 Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher participants. This will include a summary of the program, services, and partnerships that worked well for the program through eight cohorts spanning eight years. Partnerships include healthcare training providers, financial education and loan programs, personal training programs, and parenting programs. The session will also highlight the partnerships that worked well and how SDHC's Workforce and Economic Development Department navigated issues, including COVID-19, that arose. An overview of eight years of tracking, providing outcomes for all programs and partnerships, will be shared.
