PLENARY: A ROADMAP TO REDUCING CHILDHOOD POVERTY

A landmark National Academies of Sciences report commissioned by Congress concludes that childhood poverty in the U.S. could be cut in half within a decade with appropriate action. The report culls through the existing evidence-base to identify the most impactful policies including the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), child allowance, and housing assistance.

- **Aligning Health and Housing Systems with Data Analytics – PHAs and Managed Care:** This groundbreaking initiative featuring a new multi-state, multi-sector collaboration between PHAs and UnitedHealthcare (UHC) Medicaid managed care plans uses data sharing and analytics to develop place-based health interventions.



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- **Eliminating Barriers to Postsecondary Achievement:** PHAs are engaging in innovative partnerships to increase post-secondary educational achievement for low-income residents and provide housing stability for students in postsecondary education.
- **Creating Moves to Opportunity to Improve Life Economic Mobility:** Researchers and practitioners cover a range of housing mobility strategies undertaken by PHAs and their partners to improve access to high opportunity neighborhoods.

KEYNOTE: GETTING TO THE ROOT OF HEALTH DISPARITIES: UNDERSTANDING AND ADDRESSING SOCIAL INEQUITIES

Dr. Camara Jones, a Senior Fellow at Morehouse School of Medicine and a past president of the American Public Health Association, will discuss systemic, historical inequities that constrict the social safety net and ways cross-sector collaboration can help improve health outcomes, educational attainment, and housing stability.

BREAKOUTS: PEER-TO-PEER WORKING ROUNDTABLES

Participants will choose smaller group discussions within each session to engage with peers around specific topics of interest. The roundtables will cater to organizations with all levels of experience and engagement with cross-sector partners.

- **Health & Housing – Making Community Health a Priority:** The discussions will focus on an array of topics related to health and housing partnerships. Participants will discuss how organizations collaborate, including what successes and stumbling blocks exist.
- **Education & Housing – Making Education a Priority:** This session provides an opportunity to connect with colleagues on relevant issues in the housing-education space such as attendance, literacy, early childhood, education for homeless youth, out-of-school time, and postsecondary education.
- **Data & Metrics – What to Measure, Why, and How:** Data collaboration is central to successful cross-sector partnerships, but it does pose some challenges. This learning and networking session will focus on both education and health data collaborations.

BREAKOUTS: LESSONS LEARNED FROM THE FIELD

- **Health and Housing Research Symposium:** With ever-growing interest in the intersection between housing and health, researchers are evaluating the impact of cross-sector interventions. This session will bring together researchers to share insights from their work relevant to practitioners and policymakers.
- **Early Childhood Education – A Case Study of Impactful Partnership:** Learn about the Housing Authority of the City of Pittsburgh's (HACP) cross-sector collaboration with Duquesne University and ABK Learning and Development Center created to improve life outcomes for HACP residents. Panelists will discuss the inclusion and importance of anchor institutions, how the collaboration was formed, and what the partnership has been able to achieve.
- **Leveraging Special Purpose Housing Vouchers to Integrate Services for Special Needs Populations:** In 2018, HUD received significant resources for Mainstream and Family Unification Program vouchers. HUD, HHS, and PHA staff will discuss forging innovative cross-sector partnerships to support long-term housing stability for those particularly vulnerable to homelessness.
