

- It fails communities—Black, LatinX, Indigenous, Pacific Islanders and Asians, those with low incomes and in rural areas who are faced with the burden of structural racism and other forms of inequity.

Racism, not race, is the root cause of maternal health disparities


Housing Instability & Homelessness: A Structural and Systemic Issue



- •1 in 5: people who experience homelessness in year prior gave birth to an infant with low birth weight
- •50% increase in risk
